#### STRATEGY OVERVIEW

The Southern Group was competitively selected to serve as DeSoto County's state government relations representative in 2014 and has proudly maintained that role ever since. We were awarded the contract following a competitive bidding process, demonstrating both our strategic capabilities and our commitment to supporting Florida's rural communities. From the outset, we recognized the unique needs and constraints that the County faces as a smaller, rural, fiscally constrained county that TSG was well poised to assist with.

#### **RESULTS**

TSG has delivered significant, tangible results for DeSoto County through persistent advocacy and strategic engagement with state agencies and legislative leadership.

The County's lead lobbyist secured \$500,000 for the construction of two critical lift stations. We successfully advocated for \$750,000 to fund the construction of a new fire station, a project that had remained out of reach due to fiscal constraints. We secured over \$1 million for vital water infrastructure projects and successfully worked with Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to forgive County road debt. Our team also secured \$310,000 for fire safety equipment and \$800,000 for a priority road improvement project, critical for ensuring safe and reliable access for residents and businesses alike.

During the 2025 Legislative Session, our team secured \$5 million for the expansion of a wastewater treatment facility, \$3 million for the Kings Highway Expansion and \$1 million for the first County Fire Training Tower. We leveraged strategic relationships within the Florida Department of Emergency Management (FDEM) to assist the County with FEMA reimbursements for damages from previous storms. We have also worked FDOT and the Florida Department of Environmental Protect on grant and funding opportunities.

Our team has worked with Sarasota County since 2013 and has been providing regular strategic advice to County officials. We have a deep understanding of the County's challenges and priorities, which enables our firm to collaborate effectively and marry strategic government relations advice with the County priorities.

#### **RESULTS**

Being a coastal county, water quality initiatives are an enormous priority for both the county and the legislative delegation. We have capitalized on those shared priorities and secured tens of millions of dollars for Sarasota County's water quality and beach renourishment initiatives.

The County's growth has resulted in significant transportation and infrastructure challenges. The Southern Group worked with the FDOT on a road swap agreement for the critical redevelopment of River Road and have secured over \$12 million in funding road improvements for the County.

TSG worked with the County, the Governor's Office and the Florida Sports Foundation to secure spring training funding for the Atlanta Braves and worked with state agencies on infrastructure funding for the Construction of their new stadium in Sarasota County.

With the County's extraordinary growth, Fire/EMS training has been a critical need and our team with the help of the elected delegation was able to secure **\$2 million** to fund a new Regional Fire/EMS Training Academy.





#### STRATEGY OVERVIEW

The Southern Group has represented Pinellas County since 2018. Through this comprehensive partnership, we have worked on a host of local government issues from fending off attacks on home rule, to emergency operations, to red tide response, and numerous local appropriations projects.

Outside of committee weeks and legislative session, our lobbyists are meeting with decision makers at every level of government, advocating for additional funding or policy priorities for the County.

We have been focused on assisting the County with their efforts both on the state and federal levels in overcoming regulatory and funding hurdles related to beach renourishment. Additionally, TSG assists in coordinating with the Governor's Office and state agencies during hurricane season.

#### **RESULTS**

During the 2024 legislative session, TSG secured **\$24.9 million** in the budget solely for the County. Of those funds, **\$15 million** was used for environmental remediation of the former Toytown Landfill in order for the site to be used for the purposes of youth sports.

The remaining \$10 million was dedicated to stormwater improvements and a joint-use recreational facility between the school district and the county. During the 2021 legislative session, the firm successfully secured \$1.5 million for the Pinellas County Gladys Douglas Property Acquisition, a joint acquisition with the City of Dunedin, to protect significant species found in the area and to enhance the property with recreational opportunities for both residents and visitors.

TSG has also worked closely with County leadership on state agency grant opportunities and has assisted in securing over **\$30 million** in project funding.

Since being awarded DeSoto County's state lobbying contract in 2014, The Southern Group has delivered comprehensive legislative and administrative advocacy, directly aligning with the scope of services Charlotte County is seeking. Both Charlotte and DeSoto Counties are located in Southwest Florida and represent growing, rural communities with pressing infrastructure needs and increasing demands on public services.

We have helped DeSoto County overcome significant state funding challenges by advocating for targeted appropriations and working closely with key agencies. These challenges, shared by Charlotte County, include the need for fire stations, road



upgrades, water infrastructure, and emergency operations support. Our team secured more than \$3 million in funding for projects including lift stations, a new fire station, road improvements, and fire safety equipment.

We also facilitated road debt forgiveness through the Florida Department of Transportation, a complex process that reflects the type of interagency collaboration Charlotte County requires in its own transportation advocacy. Additionally, we worked with the Florida Department of Emergency Management (FDEM) to secure FEMA reimbursements, demonstrating our ability to assist counties in navigating emergency response funding systems.

The Southern Group has represented Pinellas County since 2018, providing full-service government relations support that closely reflects Charlotte County's stated needs. Our advocacy spans both the legislative and administrative branches, working year-round, not just during session, to meet the evolving priorities of the County.

Pinellas and Charlotte Counties share several key priorities: both are coastal counties dealing with storm recovery, stormwater, resiliency, and environmental preservation; both prioritize home rule authority, and both rely on close intergovernmental coordination to achieve project outcomes.

In this context, we helped secure \$24.9 million in direct appropriations for Pinellas County, including \$15 million for environmental remediation of the Toytown Landfill, a project designed to both clean up environmental hazards and support recreational infrastructure, mirroring Charlotte's dual priorities of environmental quality and public amenities. The remaining \$10 million was directed toward stormwater improvements



and a joint-use recreational facility, aligning with Charlotte's infrastructure, parks, and intergovernmental collaboration goals.

Like Charlotte County, Pinellas County is currently not receiving federal dollars for beach renourishment. The Southern Group will work with leaders on the state, federal, and regulatory levels to federalize Charlotte County's beaches and explore and advocate for all possible funding sources.

We also secured \$1.5 million for the acquisition of the Gladys Douglas Preserve in coordination with the City of Dunedin, reinforcing our experience in multi-agency cooperation and environmental conservation efforts, which are equally important to Charlotte.

Throughout our engagement, we've consistently advised on grant strategies, state agency coordination, and legislative positioning, resulting in over \$30 million in project funding. The Southern Group has also been instrumental in assisting Pinellas County with navigating the 2023 and 2024 storms.

Leveraging these shared interests, we secured millions in funding for Sarasota's water quality and beach re-nourishment initiatives, directly aligning with Charlotte's focus on environmental permitting, resiliency, and tourism infrastructure.

To address the demands of Sarasota's fast-paced growth, paralleling Charlotte's



development trajectory, we negotiated a road swap agreement with FDOT for the redevelopment of River Road and secured \$4 million in state funding for the expansion of Fruitville Road. These actions reflect the transportation and infrastructure support Charlotte seeks, including coordination with state agencies and advocacy for general infrastructure priorities.

We also worked with the Governor's Office and the Florida Sports Foundation to secure funding for spring training facilities for the Atlanta Braves, supporting economic development and tourism, which are key areas of interest for Charlotte County.

Finally, in response to rising demand for emergency services, we partnered with the legislative delegation to secure \$2 million in funding for a Regional Fire/EMS Training Academy, closely matching Charlotte's emphasis on public safety, emergency preparedness, and workforce readiness in critical service areas.

These efforts demonstrate our ability to bring together legislative relationships, agency coordination, and policy insight to deliver impactful results, just as Charlotte County requires in its state legislative representation.

#### Budget Commission targets midyear funding for key needs.

Florida lawmakers are moving to <u>authorize</u> billions in midyear spending adjustments as budget negotiations for the next fiscal year remain unresolved. The Legislative Budget Commission will meet next week to approve key amendments, including \$850 million to replenish the state's emergency preparedness fund, which faces a \$1.2 billion shortfall following the 2024 hurricane season. Lawmakers also plan to allocate \$1.7 billion for new road projects in Central Florida as part of the broader funding package.

#### DeSantis signs education, safety, and health bills.

As of May 27, Governor Ron DeSantis signed 16 bills into law covering education, public safety, health care, and fiscal policy. New measures include support for children with developmental disabilities (SB 112), medical debt protections (HB 547), legal tender recognition (HB 999), and background screening for athletic coaches (SB 1546). He also approved bills on school readiness, educator preparation, student mental health reporting, and insulin administration by non-medical caregivers. To date, the governor has signed 109 bills from the 2025 Legislative Session.

# BUDGET GOES IN TO OVERTIME

The 2025 Legislative Session, originally scheduled to conclude May 2, is set to last beyond that date as lawmakers go into overtime to negotiate the 2025-26 state budget. After hours of prolonged negotiations Friday, legislative leaders announced a joint framework for a budget deal they say will include \$2.8 billion in tax relief. With a top line number established, Members have until June 6 to complete their negotiations to finalize the General Appropriations Act, Implementing Bill and any budget conforming bills that will determine agency and project spend in the year ahead.



# AG AGENDA REAPS REWARDS





Florida lawmakers have passed a sweeping agricultural bill now heading to Governor DeSantis for final approval. SB 700 requires clear labeling for food products to prevent plant-based items from being labeled as meat, milk or eggs. Additionally, the bill includes a ban on the introduction of fluoride and other medicines in public drinking water, aligning with Florida Surgeon General Joseph Ladapo's recommendations. The bill also ensures privacy protections for agricultural landowners against drone surveillance and clears the way for schools to maintain agricultural spaces for student 4H and FFA activities without running afoul of local zoning 47 requirements.



#### Live Local Act gets a refresh.

Aimed at easing Florida's housing crisis, <u>HB 943</u> - the latest refinement of 2023's Live Local Act - is headed to the House floor. Championed by Representative Vicki Lopez, the bill expands <u>affordable housing access</u> while protecting historic districts. Critics of the bill say local governments should have ultimate control over land use decisions, even if it means stopping necessary affordable and workforce housing. However, supporters say it's an important tool against NIMBYism. The Senate companion, SB 1730, passed the Senate last week and is waiting to be taken up by the House in Messages.


Senate President Ben Albritton and House Speaker Danny Perez each announced on their respective chamber <u>floors</u> yesterday that budget



### **General Government & Technology**

Fiscal Year 2024-25 Budget Overview

This document is current as of March 8, 2024, and prior to the Governor's final signature of the budget.



Budget negotiations between the House and Senate yielded a historic \$117.46 billion budget for Fiscal Year 2024-25. The General Government & Technology portion of the budget encompasses \$6.2 billion of the overall budget. The FY 2024-25 budget will go into effect July 1, 2024.

#### **Department of Management Services (DMS)**

Budget Total: \$901 million

#### Florida Accounting Information Resource (FLAIR) System Replacement - \$660,000

Funds in Specific Appropriation 2844 are provided to implement the remediation tasks necessary to integrate agency applications with the new Florida Planning, Accounting, and Ledger Management (PALM) System.

#### Florida Capitol Elevator System Remediation - \$3.6 million

From the funds in Specific Appropriation 2859, 25 percent shall be held in reserve. The Department of Management Services is authorized to submit a budget amendment requesting release of funds held in reserve pursuant to chapter 216, Florida Statutes, contingent on the department submitting a detailed remediation plan for the elevator system located in the Capitol Building. The plan must incorporate solutions that provide the public easier access to offices and a dedicated elevator providing direct access to floors 15 through 21.

#### ADA Compliance / Life Safety Capital Projects - \$2.1 million

Funds in Specific Appropriations 2870 through 2872 shall be held in reserve contingent upon the submission of a project plan to the Executive Office of the Governor's Office of Policy and Budget, the chair of the Senate Committee on Appropriations, and the chair of the House of Representatives Appropriations Committee detailing the request for building repair, code correction, and other deficiency projects. The project plan must include all high priority deficiency issues and all issues affecting life, health, and safety. The project plan shall also include the facility, location, and estimated cost for each project and shall be submitted by August 1, 2024. The Department of Management Services shall request the release of funds pursuant to the provisions of chapter 216, Florida Statutes.

#### COST

The Southern Group proposes a **flat monthly fee of \$5,000**.
