 that you had with Mr. Deutsch or during your evaluation
 meetings, you said sometimes those conversations would

them, so I'm trying to be as efficient as I can within
the time I have with them. So typically he -- typically
he always likes to veer off the conversation. And
sometimes it would be pleasant conversations about
things like sports or just whatever it is, you know. But
for some reason, you know, he was in a -- a mood and to
discuss politics that day.

- Q. And what are the other types of political conversations that Mr. Deutsch has initiated with you?
- They would be historical in context. You 10 11 know, he -- go to his office, you'll see he's got a 12 whole museum of republican artifacts on the wall. It doesn't do any good anyhow. I constantly 4 5 correct my friends. It doesn't mean I'm any better than 6 they are, but I find it socially repulsive. I went 7 outside and confronted someone in this building who we've trespassed and had issues with because he has his 8 blank use signs in front of the commissioner building and we can't stop him because the gentleman came up here 10 with his 6 or 7-year-old granddaughter to have an appointment. And I went down and I felt stupid because 12 my brain still thinks I'm 17 and on the streets of the Bronx where I could -- I wasn't the toughest guy in the 14 15 neighborhood but I could hold my own. I -- anyway, you know, and I went down like, confront -- he's been 16 trespassed by the sheriff. He's been trespassed by 17 18 Knowlton at the beginning and, you know -- and I said, 19 you know, you don't have to tell me about your right and freedom of speech but have some level of decency. But you know, the world was 19 20 different in the 1950s than it is now. So, at one point 21 I said -- I said, yeah, I grew up -- I grew up and the -- you know, the kids in the neighborhood called me two 22 N-words. And one was the word that he took offense to 23 and the other was Nazi. So I called up being called N 24 25 and N at one time or other, but that's what happened in

the streets where I was. And in the neighborhood where I was. I was a minority member of my building. I was the only white baptist in my apartment house with 40, 50 3 4 families. But, you know, I'm making notes now because 5 I'm thinking of this because I know the kind of person I 6 7 am. I know the life that I've lived and I was married to a Black woman for five years. Never even -- never ever entered my mind in all honesty, never thought of it 9 until this whole thing came up here. And for me to say, I don't see -- I don't see color. I don't see -- no, 11 you can see color. I know if somebody is Chinese or Hispanic or Black, you know, you can see that. But I 13 14 see people first. This -- in fact, I got an award once and that 15 -- there's two or three of the awards I have here. 16 17 have most of them at home. I should have had everything 18 here because the stuff that got destroyed in my house. I was -- I was going through post stress, losing all the 19 20 stuff in the flood. But when I got the human -humanitarian award, and I jotted down some of the 21 recognition I've got from any person that I've tried to lead my life like. They had mentioned that he doesn't 23 24 have an unloving bias bone or -- in his body. 25 -- I -- I've got about a dozen different awards for

1 Α. I don't even say they re dumb or stupid or 2 lazy. 3 Q. So then after that --My kids, that's another story. 4 Α. 5 So after that, you said Mr. Harris responded 0. 6 by -- he was very upset. 7 Oh, he used the F-word to me. Α. 8 Q. And he used the word, and I got to say it. He used the word "fuck" to you. 9 10 Oh, yeah. Α. What did he say to you after you used the term 11 0. 12 "nigger" to him? Well, he said, F you and don't you ever use 13 that effing word around me and -- oh, he must have said 14 15 it at least six, seven or eight times. And I said, whoa, I'm sorry. I said, hey -- I said, you know, I 16 17 grew up with that. I didn't mean to offend you. He said -- he says, well and went on and on, and he sort of 18 stopped swearing and then maybe one or two more came 19 out. And I said, hey, I profusely apologize. I -- I 20 said, I don't use that word. And -- and I said that to 21 22 him and -- and -- but he was -- I have -- he's as angry as I've seen a person in recent history and, you know, I 24 -- I have -- and oh, we were talking about libraries and

books and background because I have a -- sure, if I

stayed in -- didn't go in the service, I would've
probably been a high school dropout. I got two master's
degrees and I walked away from a doctorate at Brown
because I couldn't afford it anymore.

5 So I'm not stupid. And I have a half a brain 6 and -- and I absolutely know the kind of person I am. 7 -- I just for fun, went down -- listen, I've had about 15 awards and -- and they started a long time ago. And 9 you can look at the humanitarian award there. I got a -- a special service award from undergraduate school. 10 The JCs recognized me for what I did in Jersey. I was 11 12 appointed to a five state Special Action Commission in the '60s to go into the inner city and help cool things 13 down because of who I am, or what I was, or where my 14 brain was, or how I saw people living in love and 15 16 harmony in my 1960s kind of fantasy.

- Q. How did that interaction end between yourself and Mr. Harris?
- A. I -- I apologized, and I'm not the kind of
 person that apologizes a lot, but I was -- never ever
 thought -- I mean, I -- sometimes my mouth moves ahead
 of my brain. I -- I'll acknowledge that. But I never
 ever, ever would have said anything to offend someone.
 To give them a bad time, to kid and joke, yeah, that's
 the kind of person I am. I would never say anything to

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offend anyone. I'm not that kind of person.

- Did you ever at any time --
- -- now, in retrospect, if I knew what I knew 3 now, obviously it never would've -- and it's a -- and 5 it's a word like the word that he used to me, no one's 6 ever heard me say that word, not -- my kids can't even. 7 And I think once I did during a divorce, they may have heard that word once. But I -- I just don't do it. I -- it doesn't serve any purpose and, you know, I -- I can -- my family is multiracial. It's multi-religious. 10 11 It's, you know, from the Italians to the Irish to the Germans to the -- my father's side of the family was 12 13 Jewish. My -- oh, grandparents' side and on the other 14 side, they were Lutheran. And so they were English, 15 Irish, German. My stepfather was Italian Catholic. He played cards with Cardinal Spellman down in St. 16 Patrick's Cathedral. He was an attorney, who probably 17 worked with the mafia. I'm not sure of that either. 18 19 But -- but -- but I know the kind of person I 20 I never in my life would do anything to offend someone. It wasn't intended that way. And it certainly 21

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was not -- in no way directed to him. So, I'm trying to

think what did I do wrong here, other than say something

that's probably stupid and I shouldn't have said it. But

I was talking about me. I was talking about when I grew

up, and what I went through with my family. And he was telling me what he went through with his family, and I --

- Q. Well, give me an example. What did he say?
- 5 And in another setting, without that reaction, 6 we probably could have ended up even a lot, lot closer 7 than just having a business relationship because in a way, I was sort of opening up about things that I don't 8 normally talk to. I don't think anyone here even knows the gal I was married to that I mentioned to you, right? 10 I didn't talk about it. You know, and they don't know 11 about, other than the stuff that's hanging on the walls 13 and -- and some of the recognition of things I've gotten because the kind of person I am. I -- you know, I'm not 14 15 the brightest. I'm not the best. I can be a buster. love to kid and joke. But I'm a people person. 16 17 didn't say things to hurt anyone ever.
 - 0. What did Mr. Harris tell you about his background?
 - He talked about, you know, his school was pretty tough. He talked about things relating to segregation and things that he had to deal with, you know, growing up. And -- and I think at one point we may have gotten a little competitive.
 - Q. Did he say where he grew up?



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He did. I -- and again, you know, I'm -- I'm 1 Α. -- I'm so emotionally stressed over this thing. I 2 3 normally only sleep two, two and a half hours a night. I've been down to an hour, an hour and a half since this 4 5 came up because I'm sort of taken aback, but it just --What did he say about his segregation 6 7 experience? I don't recall. I -- I don't want to quote 8 things he said if I -- and if you know, I -- I -- my 10 quess is that he said -- he said some things. I'm sure they were valid and true. 11 12 What did he say about --13 You know, I look -- I look at the Black youth 14 organization, The Oranges of Newark. I don't know if 15 you ever heard of them, but -- or Cliff Carter. What did he say about poverty? 16 0. 17 Α. Hold it, I just thought of this. I read H. Rap Brown's book. Do you know the title of book? 18 Which one? 19 0. 20 Α. That has the N-word in it? 21 0. Uh-huh. I mean, because I have an incredible library 22 because it's part of what I studied in one of my 23 master's degrees. 24 25 Q. Okay.

1 Α. And in the group relations and -- you know, because this is what I did. 2 3 Q. What did Mr. Harris say about his poverty? 4 You said you two were talking about --5 Well, that he was poorer than I was. And 6 things generally were tougher for him than they were for 7 me. 8 Did he give any examples? What did he say? Q. 9 He probably did. You know, I'm -- I'm really 10 -- I don't want to -- I don't want to misrepresent something if it -- and I literally don't -- I'm not even 11 -- you know, I'm -- and I'm using a five-inch brush with 13 the things that I'm saying I said. But I know when it 14 came to those N-words -- and if he ever -- if he said I referred to him or called him either one of those, 15 that's an absolute lie because I did not. I said that's 16 17 what I was called in my neighborhood and that was the 18 only reference I made. That was once and he -- he lost 19 control. And I -- I -- I rain fact, I used the word 20 profusely, which I probably couldn't spell, but I -- but 21 I -- I said, hey, I am so sorry. I wouldn't say that, 22 you know. And he --23 Did you ever gesture with your fist in the air 0. saying, fight, fight, fight? 24

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I don't think so. I don't think so. Unless I

- was mocking something Trump did when he was talking about Trump, because he flipped out over Trump. Not as bad as he did over me, but close. And I'm -- I -- I'm 3 4 literally taken aback and amazed seriously that anything -- because I -- I have friends of color that use those 5 words a lot with me, both of them, all three of them. 6 7 Is there anyone who may have overheard your Q. interaction with Mr. Harris? 8 I don't think so. I don't think so. 9 Did anyone come in the office while you two 10 11 were talking? No. He was -- maybe the door was closed. I 12 don't know. It's rare that I close the door. 13 14 0. Okay. You know, I -- I -- if he said the door was 15 closed or whatever he said, I'm sure he's right. 16 17 Q. Okay. 18 I don't know if you asked him that. Okay. Is there anything else that you'd like 19 to add that we haven't covered yet? No. I -- I -- I was frankly, and I -- I tried 21 Α. to do a little research, the word he called me, I couldn't find in the dictionary. 23 24 Q. What word did he call you?

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2 And I never referred to him with the word. 3 mean, he only used it to me once. He said -- and then -- well, maybe twice. But then he just said -- he 5 referred to the F-word in relationship to the -- to the N-word. You know, I hate that word and I, you know -- I 7 -- but -- and I just mentioned in passing that I grew up and that's what I was called in my neighborhood by my 9 friends who are multiracial, multi -- you know, the only prejudice I really saw in my neighborhood in retrospect 11 was the Catholics hated the Jews. And I -- and -- you know, and I -- and I can remember, you know, as we got 13 to be 14 and 15 and could solve the problems of the world, I can remember saying, why -- why do you -- why 15 do you hate the Jews? Well, they killed Jesus. 16 Jesus Jewish? You know, and then they'd say, well -you know, we -- I mean, the kind of banter you'd have on the street corner. They'd say, yeah, well, you know, 18 19 you guys keep your churches locked up. I says, yeah, 20 because you guys are going to come in to steal the stuff. You know? 21 22 But I mean, you know -- and -- but I --I have -- I have no idea what I can say at this point. 23 24 And I repeatedly apologized to him because I was like, 25 I was taken aback of how aggressive he got



with me and, you know, intellectually I still have a lot of respect for him. He may have an issue with some 2 things, I may have issues with some things, but I -- I 3 4 was really flabbergasted and -- and I -- I can only talk 5 about the -- the people in my family and the people I know, and I deal with people as human beings. And then in 1990, they 25 couldn't find somebody dumb enough to run for lieutenant

And that was so cool. And -- and I said -- and I said to them, I says, because you know I like the food, right? You know -and they says, no, because you're so great and if we 24 ever need anything, you're there. We can count on you and support us and, you know -- you know, so --25

- 7 have done that when I was 17, but, you know -- and I --
- 8 I am literally incredibly internally upset over this.

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
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


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


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
