PART I - INSTRUCTIONS

RP-01 INTENT:

- A. It is the intent of the County to select a firm who clearly demonstrates the highest level of ability and proven reliability to perform the professional services specified in the Scope of Services. Brief summaries applicable to the required work should be included with the proposal.
- B. **Time and Date Due -** Charlotte County will accept proposals from individuals, corporations, partnerships, and other legal entities authorized to conduct business in the State of Florida until **3:00 p.m., MARCH 4, 2025.**
- C. In order to ensure that all prospective proposers have sufficient information and understanding of the County's needs, a Pre-submittal Conference will be held FEBRUARY 19, 2025 @ 10:00 a.m., Administration Complex, 18500 Murdock Circle, Purchasing Division Conference Room 344, Port Charlotte, Florida. Attendance of this meeting is <u>not</u> mandatory; however, interested proposers are encouraged to attend.
- **RP-02 CONTRACT AWARDS:** The County anticipates entering into a contract with the one (1) firm who submits the proposal judged to be most advantageous to the County. The selected firm shall be required to sign a formal agreement in the standard form currently used by Charlotte County for professional services.

The proposer understands that this RFP does not constitute an agreement or a contract with the proposer. A proposal is not binding until proposals are reviewed and accepted by the Board of County Commissioners and a contract is executed by both parties.

- **RP-03 DEVELOPMENT COSTS:** The County shall not be liable for any expense incurred in connection with preparation of a response to this Request for Proposal (RFP). Proposers should prepare a straightforward and concise description of the proposers' ability to meet the requirements of the RFP.
- **RP-04 INQUIRIES:** The County will not respond to oral inquiries. Proposers may submit written or emailed inquiries regarding this RFP to Purchasing, 18500 Murdock Circle, Suite 344, Port Charlotte, Florida 33948 or kimberly.chamberlain@charlottecountyfl.gov, or they may be addressed at the pre-submittal conference. The County will respond to written or emailed inquiries received at least five (5) calendar days prior to the RFP due date.

The County will record its responses to inquiries and any supplemental instructions in the form of written addenda. It shall be the responsibility of the proposer, prior to submitting their proposals, to view the website https://purchasingbids.charlottecountyfl.gov to determine if addenda were issued, acknowledging and incorporating them into their proposal.

RP-05 PROPOSAL SUBMISSION AND WITHDRAWAL: The County will receive proposals electronically. Please visit http://bit.ly/3TYAyKa and follow given instructions.

Proposals received after the established deadline will not be opened. Proposers may withdraw their proposal by notifying the County in writing at any time prior to the due date. Proposals not so withdrawn shall, upon opening, constitute an irrevocable offer for a period of 120 days to provide Charlotte County the services set forth in these specifications until one of the proposals has been accepted by the Board of County Commissioners. Upon opening, proposals become "public records" and shall be subject to public disclosure in accordance with Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.

RP-06 PROPOSAL RESTRICTIONS:

- A. In order to control the cost of preparation, submittals should be limited to a maximum of 50 pages, one-sided, excluding cover letter, index, dividers, resumes, and the required forms.
- B. In accordance with Ordinance #96-002, the manufacture, use, display or other employment of any facsimile or reproduction of the Charlotte County Seal, without the express, prior, written approval of the Board of County Commissioners of Charlotte County, Florida, is hereby declared to be unlawful and punishable as a Second-Degree Misdemeanor as provided in Section 165.043. Florida Statutes.

RP-07 DRUG FREE WORKPLACE: Charlotte County is a Drug Free Workplace. It is strongly suggested that the attached

RP-08 PUBLIC ENTITY CRIMES STATEMENT: In accordance with Florida Statutes Sec. 287.133(2)(a), "A person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods/services to a public entity, may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for construction or repair of a public building or public work, may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a Contractor, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with any public entity, and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, for Category Two, for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list".

RP-09 CANCELLATION/TERMINATION: The County shall have the right to unilaterally cancel, terminate or suspend this Contract, in whole or in part, by providing the successful proposer thirty (30) days written notice by certified mail.

It is expressly understood by the County and the Contractor that funding for any successive fiscal years is contingent upon appropriation of monies by the Board of County Commissioners. In the event funds are not available or not appropriated, the County reserves the right to terminate the Contract and/or individual leases. The County will be responsible for any outstanding invoices prior to the termination.

RP-10 RESERVED RIGHTS: The County reserves the right to accept or reject any and/or all proposals, to waive irregularities and technicalities, and to request resubmission. Any sole response received the first submission date may or may not be rejected by the County, depending on available competition and timely needs of the County. The County shall be the sole judge of the proposal and the resulting agreement that is in its best interest, and its decision shall be final.

The County reserves the right to accept or reject any or any part of the submissions, if it is deemed in the best interest of the County. The County, in its sole discretion, may expand the scope of work to include additional requirements. The County reserves the right to investigate as it deems necessary to determine the ability of any firm to perform the work or services requested. The firms, upon request shall provide information the County deems necessary in order to make a determination.

RP-11 EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY CLAUSE: Charlotte County, Florida, in accordance with the provisions of Title VII of The Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252) and the Regulations of the Department of Commerce (15 CFR, Part 8) issued pursuant to such Act, hereby notifies all firms it will affirmatively ensure in any contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement, women-owned and minority business enterprises (collectively MBEs) will be afforded full opportunity to submit proposals in response to this advertisement and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of gender, race, color or national origin in consideration for an award. The County will consider the firm's status as an MBE or a certified MBE, and also the status of any sub-contractors or sub-consultants proposed to be utilized by the firm, within the evaluation process. Interested MBEs and certified MBEs are encouraged to respond.

All firms are hereby notified that the successful firms must and shall comply with the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Florida Civil Rights Act, all as amended. Specifically, firms agree that:

No person shall, on the grounds of race, color, sex, religion, age, disability, national origin or marital status, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program, activity or service funded through this Contract.

- Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, age, disability, national origin or marital status. Contractor agrees to post in a conspicuous place, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
- Contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements regarding program activities, services provided or applications for employment, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for services or employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, disability, national origin or marital status.
- County may require Contractor to submit reports as may be necessary to indicate non-discrimination. County
 officials will be permitted access to Contractor's books, records, accounts and other sources of information and
 its facilities as may be pertinent to ascertain compliance with non-discrimination laws.

It is expressly understood that County shall have the right to terminate this Contract upon receipt of evidence of discrimination.

RP-12 PAYMENT: Request for payment must be submitted to Charlotte County Purchasing on a form approved by the County in accordance with contract documents. Price shall be net and all invoices payable according to the Local Government Prompt Payment Act (F.S.218.74).

RP-13 PERFORMANCE EVALUATION: At the end of the Contract, the receiving department will evaluate the successful proposers' performance. This evaluation will become public record.

RP-14 INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS: Contractor and subcontractors shall procure and maintain until all of their obligations have been discharged, including any warranty periods under this Contract are satisfied, insurance against claims for injury to persons or damage to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Contractor, his agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.

The insurance requirements herein are minimum requirements for this Contract and in no way limit the indemnity covenants contained in this Contract. The County in no way warrants that the minimum limits contained herein are sufficient to protect the Contractor from liabilities that might arise out of the performance of the work under this Contract by the Contractor, his agents, representatives, employees, or subcontractors. Contractor is free to purchase such additional insurance as may be determined necessary.

A. MINIMUM SCOPE AND LIMITS OF INSURANCE - Contractor shall provide coverage with limits of liability not less than those stated below. An excess liability policy or umbrella liability policy may be used to meet the minimum liability requirements provided that the coverage is written on a "following form" basis.

1. Commercial General Liability - Occurrence Form (CG 00 01)

Policy shall include bodily injury, property damage, broad form contractual liability and Explosion, Collapse and Underground (XCU) coverage.

- a. The policy shall be endorsed to include the following additional insured language: "Charlotte County a political subdivision of the state of Florida and it officers, employees, agents and volunteers" shall be named as an additional insured with respect to liability arising out of the activities performed by, or on behalf of the Contractor.
- b. Contractor's subcontractors shall be subject to the same minimum requirements identified above.
- c. Policy shall be endorsed for a waiver of subrogation against the Charlotte County.

2. Automobile Liability

Bodily injury and property damage for any owned, hired, and non-owned vehicles used in the performance of this Contract. Automobile liability must be written on a standard ISO form (CA 00 01) covering any auto (Code 1), or if Contractor has no owned autos, hired (Code 8) and non-owned (Code 9) autos.

Combined Single Limit (CSL)

- a. The policy shall be endorsed to include the following additional insured language: "Charlotte County a political subdivision of the state of Florida and it officers, employees, agents and volunteers" shall be named as an additional insured with respect to liability arising out of the activities performed by, or on behalf of the Contractor, including automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by the Contractor".
- b. Contractor's sub-contractors shall be subject to the same minimum requirements identified in this section.
- c. Policy shall contain a waiver of subrogation against the Charlotte County.

3. Worker's Compensation and Employers' Liability

- Policy shall contain a waiver of subrogation against the Charlotte County.
- b. Contractor's sub-contractors shall be subject to the same minimum requirements identified in this section.
- c. If the contractor has no employees the contractor must submit to the County the Workers Compensation Exemption from the State of Florida.

4. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions Liability) for Prime Contractors

a. Estimated Projection Construction Cost up to \$9,999,999

b. Estimated Projection Construction Cost from \$10,000,000 to \$19,999,999

- d. In the event that any professional liability insurance required by this Contract is written on a claims-made basis, Contractor warrants that any retroactive date under the policy shall precede the effective date of this Contract; and that either continuous coverage will be maintained or an extended discovery period will be exercised for a period of five (5) years beginning at the time work under this Contract is completed.
- e. Policy shall contain a waiver of subrogation against Charlotte County.

5. Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions Liability) for Subcontractors

In addition to the insurance requirements for the Contractor, the contractor's registered sub-contractors (including structural, civil, mechanical, plumbing, electrical engineering, landscape architecture, survey, geotechnical and materials testing) are required to carry Professional Liability insurance at the same levels and conditions as the Contractor.

Additional Insured – All policies, <u>except</u> for the Workers Compensation and Professional Liability shall contain endorsements naming the County its officers, employees, agents and volunteers as additional insured with respect to liabilities arising out of the performance of services contained herein. The additional insured endorsements shall not limit the scope of coverage for the County to vicarious liability but shall allow coverage for the County to full extent provided by the policy, even if those limits exceed those required by this contract. Such additional insured coverage shall be at least as broad as Additional Insured (Form B) endorsement form ISO, CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 and CG 20 37 if later revisions used.

<u>Waiver of Subrogation Rights</u> – The Contractor shall require the carriers of required coverages to waive all rights of subrogation against the County, its officers, employees, agents and volunteers. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation. All general or auto liability insurance coverage provided shall not prohibit the Contractor and Contractor's employees or agents from waiving the right of subrogation prior to a loss or claim. The Contractor hereby waives all rights of subrogation against the County.

<u>Policies Primary and Non-Contributory</u> – For any claims related to this contract, the Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the County, its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the County, its officers, employees, agents, or volunteers shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

<u>Severability of Interests –</u> The Contractor agrees to ensure that coverage provided to meet these requirements is applicable separately to each insured and there will be no cross-liability exclusions that preclude coverage for suits between the Contractor and the County or between the County and any other insured or additional insured under the policy.

<u>Proof of Coverage</u> - Prior to the commencement of performance of services the Contractor shall furnish to the <u>County Purchasing Division</u> Certificates of Insurance and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required. These certificates shall provide that such insurance shall not be terminated or expire without notice thereof in accordance with the policy provisions and Contractor shall maintain such insurance from the time the Contractor commences performance of services until completion of such services. Within seven (7) calendar days of notice of award, the Contractor shall furnish a copy of the Declaration page and required endorsements for all applicable policies and will provide complete certified copies of the policies and endorsements immediately upon request.

<u>Acceptability of insurance carrier</u> – Unless otherwise approved by Risk Management, Insurance shall be written by insurers authorized to do business in the State of Florida and with a minimum Best Insurance Guide rating of "A:VII".

<u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retention</u> – Any and all deductibles or self-insured retentions in excess of \$10,000 shall be declared to and approved by Risk Management. The County may require the Contractor to purchase coverage with a lower deductible or retention or provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration and defense expenses within the deductible or retention.

<u>Failure to Procure Coverage</u> – In the event that any policy of insurance required under this contract does not comply with the requirements, is not procured or is cancelled and not replaced, the County has the right but not the obligation or duty to terminate the contract or obtain insurance if it deems necessary and any premiums paid by the County will be promptly

reimbursed by the Contractor or County payments to the Contractor will be reduced to pay for County purchased insurance.

<u>Insurance Review</u> – Insurance requirements are subject to periodic review by the County. The Risk Manager or designee is authorized, but not required, to reduce, waive, or suspend any insurance requirements whenever Risk Management determines that any of the required insurance is not available, is unreasonably priced or is not needed to protect the interests of the County. In addition, if Risk Management determines that heretofore, unreasonably or unavailable types of insurance coverage or coverage limits become reasonably priced or available, the Risk Manager or designee is authorized, but not required, to change the above insurance requirements to require additional types of insurance coverage or higher coverage limits, provided that any such change is reasonable in light of past claims against the County, inflation, or any other item reasonably related to the County's risk. Any change requiring additional types of insurance coverage or higher coverage limits must be made by amendment to this contract. Contractor agrees to execute any such amendment within thirty (30) days of receipt.

Any failure, actual, or alleged, on part of the County to monitor or enforce compliance with any of the insurance and indemnification requirements will not be deemed as a waiver of any rights on the par to the County.

RP-15 UNAUTHORIZED ALIEN WORKERS: Charlotte County will not intentionally award publicly funded contracts to any contractor who knowingly employs unauthorized alien workers, constituting a violation of the employment provisions contains in 8 U.S.C. Section 1324a [Section 274A of the Immigration and Nationality Act ("INA")]. The County shall consider employment by any Contractor of unauthorized aliens a violation of Section 274A of the INA. Such violation by the Contractor of the employment provisions contained in Section 274A of the INA shall be grounds for termination of this Agreement by the County. In addition, pursuant to Section 448.095 of the Florida Statutes, all persons or firms entering into contracts with Charlotte County are required to register with, and use, the E-Verify system of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to electronically verify the employment eligibility of all newly hired employees. The County may terminate this Agreement for failure on the part of the Contractor to use E-Verify. Contract termination for failure to use E-Verify is not considered a breach of contract pursuant to s. 448.095(2)(c)3, Fla. Stat.

RP-16 EMPLOYEE BACKGROUND CHECK: If an owner, except a stockholder in a publicly traded corporation, or an employee of the Contractor has been convicted of any offenses requiring registration as a sexual offender or sexual predator, regardless of the location of conviction, the Contractor shall ensure that the offender's or predator's work on the project is consistent with the terms of his probation and registry requirements.

RP-17 PUBLIC RECORDS CLAUSE TO CONTRACTORS "ACTING ON BEHALF OF THE COUNTY": Pursuant to Section 119.0701 of the Florida Statutes, Contractors acting on behalf of the County must comply with the public records laws, specifically: a) keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the contracted services; b) upon request from the County's custodian of public records, provide the County with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Chapter 119 of the Florida Statutes or as otherwise provided by law; c) ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and following completion of the contract; and d) upon completion of the contract, keep and maintain all public records required by the County to perform the service, and meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records.

RP-18 SOCIAL, POLITICAL, OR IDEOLOGICAL INTERESTS: Charlotte County will not request documentation of, or consider a vendor's social, political, or ideological interests when determining if the vendor is a responsible vendor. Charlotte County does not give preference to vendors based on social, political, or ideological interests.

PART II SCOPE OF SERVICES

RP-19 PURPOSE: Charlotte County is requesting proposals from qualified firms to provide professional Construction Manager (CM) at Risk services as part of a design and construction team, which includes various design and engineering consultants, stakeholders, and County staff. This is a grant funded project through the Florida Department of Emergency Management Agreement F00131.

RP-20 PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

- A. The site is located at 26571 Airport Road, Punta Gorda, Florida 33982.
- B. Renovate the existing 30,000 square foot Emergency Management Center and construct a 5,000 square foot addition.
- C. The building delivery method is CM at Risk.
- D. Provide all utilities to the site.

RP-21 PROJECT OBJECTIVES:

- A. Qualifications-based selection will be used in choosing the Contractor.
- B. The selected firm will fully participate with the design consultants and County team delivering all project construction activities while providing independent user-ready facilities within scope and project budget.
- C. The development program shall generally consist of, but are not limited to, the following elements:
 - 1. Utilize Master Space Planning data to further programming and future needs.
 - 2. Buildout and reconfiguration of existing facility to include warranted upgrades to water and sewer facilities.
 - 3. Expansion of area to support emergency operations to include functional operation breakout rooms.
 - 4. Improve infrastructure and updated systems, to include but not limited to, AV system, communication systems, and battery backup capabilities.
 - 5. Expand current kitchen to a full-service eat-in kitchen with exhaust hood.
 - 6. Provide additional bathrooms with showers.
 - 7. Provide additional office space for anticipated additional public safety staff.
 - 8. Revitalized bunk space and additional locker room space.
- D. The successful construction management services will be conducted in two (2) phases, pre-construction, and construction management, for this project.
- E. The project shall meet all applicable building codes, including barrier free design.
- F. The building will be designed and constructed as an essential facility and will need to be hardened beyond the hurricane rated impacts required by applicable building codes.
- G. The facility will utilize integrated building automation systems.
- H. Design and construction shall consider life-cycle costs, long-term maintenance, energy conservation, and long-term operational costs.
- I. The project will utilize Building Information Modeling (BIM) protocols during the design and construction.
- J. The design and construction will utilize sustainable building practices, comparable to Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) or similar rating system principles, without pursuing any certification levels.

RP-22 PROPOSED PROJECT BUDGET AND SCHEDULE: The total project budget for the design, construction, site work, furniture, fixtures and equipment, and all fees is \$12,000,000. The design and permitting portion of the budget is \$1,000,000. The pre-construction services and construction fee will be deducted from the construction budget amount. The design and permitting shall be completed within 365 calendar days from the date of the issuance of the design contract. The construction shall be completed within 365 calendar days from the notice to proceed date.

RP-23 GENERAL SCOPE OF SERVICES: The scope of services shall include, but not be limited to the following:

- A. Pre-construction Services Design Review and Recommendations. All communications shall go through the single point of contact identified as the Facilities Construction and Maintenance Projects Manager with Charlotte County.
 - 1. Shall become thoroughly familiar with the evolving plans and specifications and follow the development of design from schematic review through construction documents.
 - 2. Complete budgetary reviews at each design phase ensuring the project remains on budget.
 - 3. Shall make written recommendations regarding all construction aspects and cost reducing alternatives.
 - 4. Assist architect and County Project Manager in alternative comparison verses long-term cost effects.
 - 5. Shall work as a team with design consultants and County staff.
 - 6. Shall bring to the attention of the County Project Manager and architect any known defects in the design drawings and specifications.
 - 7. Review and advise on life-cycle costs of proposed materials and equipment.
 - 8. Apply for the required building permits coordinating with the Project Manager for making payment.
 - 9. Provide a Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP), by preparing and publicly bidding, meeting the project program and budget.

- 10. Complete County provided risk registry with the project team.
- 11. Allowances for environmental mitigation in conjunction with permitting guidelines.
- 12. BIM Clash with Navisworks, coordinated with all models, at each design deliverable.
- B. Construction Services During the construction phase, the Construction Manager shall become the single point of responsibility for performance of the construction contract for the project and shall function in the role of an independent general Contractor. That role will include:
 - 1. Manage the resultant subcontracts / purchase orders after awarding bid packages for labor and materials.
 - 2. The Contractor shall develop, update, and report progress on a Critical Path Method-based design schedule through 100% construction, including closed punch list items. Prepare the overall project schedule and providing periodic detailed updates.
 - 3. Establish and maintain quality control standards.
 - 4. Obtain the required building permits and complete required inspections closing all permits.
 - 5. Provide all building construction activities, including all building manufacturer coordination, site, Civil, and utility work.
 - 6. Provide quality control and quality assurance testing for construction.
 - 7. Coordinate and review all shop drawings and submittals.
 - 8. Coordinate all construction activities with any work performed on-site.
 - 9. Guaranteeing the construction cost.
 - 10. Conduct periodic construction progress meetings with design firm and County representatives.
 - 11. Frequent observations when work is being performed and circumstances may require determining the progress and quality of the construction project.
 - 12. Conduct field inspections and provide monthly field/progress reports including contingency authorization logs and progress photos.
 - 13. Obtain Certificate of Occupancy.
 - 14. Provide one (1) copy of close-out documentation in paper and one (1) copy in electronic format with subcontractor list with contact information, all submittals, operating manual, as-built drawings, Test and Balance Report, IT testing data, and any additional pertinent information. Maintain and finalize the County asset list and provide a copy of the permitted plans with marked changes.
 - 15. Complete asset management inventory documents provided by the County for uploading into program software.
 - 16. Coordinate and perform necessary warranty work.
 - 17. No stored materials.
 - 18. Changes in schedule of values and budget transfers must have written authorization from the County prior to the change.

RP-24 PROPOSAL FORMAT: Contractor shall prepare their proposals using the format outlined in the Consultant Evaluation Form. The Contractor shall present a comprehensive and integrated picture of the project team capabilities meeting all project objectives and completing a successful project. The proposal shall address the Contractor's experience, management plans, project organization, and budget and schedule performance. methodologies, strategies, action plans, rather than general description. Wherever possible, specific examples of past work shall be used to illustrate skills and capabilities in similar projects.

RP-25 SPECIALIZED EXPERIENCE PREFERRED: The proposer should have strong experience with multi-use government facilities, Public Safety facilities, Grant Projects, Harden Structures, Command Centers, and Construction Management Delivery method.

After recommendation of award, the successful proposer shall not be allowed to substitute project team members named in this proposal without the prior written permission of the County. Substitution may, in the sole opinion of the County, be grounds for cancellation of a recommended award, or termination of agreement.

The County reserves the right to accept or reject any or all submissions, or to accept all or any part of the submission, if it is deemed in the best interest of the County. The County, in its sole discretion, may expand the scope of work to include additional requirements. The County reserves the right to investigate as it deems necessary to determine the ability of any firm to perform the work or services requested. Information deemed necessary by the County in order to decide shall be provided by the firms, upon request.

END OF PART II PART III FEDERAL PROVISIONS

The projects, programs, and activities to be completed under this Agreement are fully or partially funded by Federal funding, grants and/or disaster assistance from various federal and state agencies including, but not limited to, the Florida Division of Emergency Management (FDEM) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). contractors Therefore, consultants, and subcontractors (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor") will be required to comply with the applicable provisions of 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II and with the following provisions, as applicable. The Contractor shall require compliance with all applicable federal requirements as may be required by 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II, and as are listed below, of all subcontractors performing work the value of which is in excess of \$10,000, by including these federal requirements in all contracts with subcontractors.

Controlled Substances. Contractor agrees that it shall not knowingly use funds provided under this Agreement to support activities that promote the legalization of any drug or other substance included in Schedule I of the schedule of controlled substances established by section 202 of the Controlled Substances Act, 21 U.S.C. 812.

Human Rights. Contractor assures that the human rights of all persons with developmental disabilities (especially those without familial protection) who are receiving treatment, services or habilitation under programs assisted under this title, will be protected consistent with P.L. 88-164, Title I, s. 110, as amended, 42 U.S.C. s. 6009, the federal Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act, and s. 393.13, Fla. Stat., Florida's Bill of Rights of Persons with Developmental Disabilities.

Restrictions on Abortion and on Distribution of Sterile Needles. Contractor agrees that it shall not use funds provided under this Agreement for an abortion. Further, Contractor agrees that funds shall not be used to carry out any program of distributing sterile needles or syringes for hypodermic injection of any illegal drug.

U.S. Flag Air Carrier. Contractor agrees that as it pertains to the services provided under this Agreement, U.S. flag air carriers shall be used to the maximum extent possible when commercial air transportation is the means of travel between the United States and a foreign country or between foreign countries.

U.S. Patriot Act; Public Health Security & Bioterrorism Preparedness & Response Act. Contractor will comply with the Uniting and Strengthening America by Providing Appropriate Tools Required to Intercept and Obstruct Terrorism Act (USA Patriot Act) amending 18 U.S.C. 175-175c.; The Public Health Security and Bioterrorism Preparedness and Response Act of 2002, 42 U.S.C. 201.

Trafficking Victims Protection Act. Contractor will comply with the requirements of Section 106(g) of the Trafficking Victims Protection Act (TVPA) of 2000, as 7104) amended (22 U.S.C. which prohibits Contractor/consultant from (1) engaging in severe forms of trafficking in persons during the period of time that this Contractor Agreement is in effect; (2) procuring a commercial sex act during the period of time that this Contractor Agreement is in effect; or (3) using forced labor in the performance of the Contractor services under this Contractor Agreement. This Contractor Agreement may be unilaterally terminated immediately by County for Contractor's violating this provision, without penalty.

The Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7401 et seq. and Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.

Procurement of Recovered Materials. Contractor and any subcontractor agree to comply with Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, and the regulatory provisions of 40 CFR Part 247. In the performance of this Agreement and to the extent practicable, the Contractor and subcontractor are to use products containing the highest percentage of recovered materials for items designated by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) under 40 CFR Part 247.

Debarment and Suspension. This Agreement is a covered transaction for purposes of 2 C.F.R. Part 180 and 2 C.F.R. Part 3000. As such, the Contractor is required to verify that none of the Contractor's principals (defined at 2 C.F.R s.180.995) or its affiliates (defined at 2 C.F.R. s. 180.905) are excluded (defined at 2 C.F.R. s. 180.940) or disqualified (defined at 2 C.F.R. s 180.935). The Contractor must comply with 2 C.F.R. Part 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. Part 3000, subpart C, and must include a requirement to comply with these regulations in any lower tier covered transaction it enters into. This certification is a material representation of fact relied upon by Charlotte County. If it is later determined that the Contractor did not comply with 2 C.F.R. Part 180, subpart C, and 2 C.F.R. Part 3000, subpart C, in addition to remedies made available to Charlotte County, the federal government may pursue available remedies, including but not limited to suspension and/or debarment. The bidder or proposer agrees to comply with the requirements of 2 C.F.R. Part 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. Part 3000, subpart C while this offer is valid and throughout the period of any contract that may arise from this offer. The bidder or proposer further agrees to include a provision requiring such compliance in its lower tier covered transaction.

Equal Employment Opportunity (2 CFR Part 200, Appendix II(C); 41 CFR § 61-1.4; 41 CFR 61-4.3; Executive Order 11246). Enhanced Whistleblower Protections. The National Defense Authorization Act of 2013 extending whistleblower protections to Contractor employees may apply to the Federal grant award dollars involved with this Agreement.

Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA). In accordance with FFATA, the Contractor shall, upon request, provide the County the names and total compensation of the five most highly compensated officers of the entity, if the entity in the preceding fiscal year received 80 percent or more of its annual gross revenues in federal awards, received \$25,000,000 or more in annual gross revenues from federal awards, and if the public does not have access to information about the compensation of the senior executives of the entity through periodic reports

filed under section 13(a) or 15(d) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 or section 6104 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

Federal Awardee Performance and Integrity Information System (FAPIIS). The Contractor shall update the information in the Federal Awardee Performance and Integrity Information System (FAPIIS) on a semi-54r

Sub Agreements/Assignments and W/MBE. Contractor shall not subcontract, nor assign this Agreement, or any part of the services provided under this Agreement, without prior written consent of County. In accordance with 45 CFR s. 75.330 and 2 CFR s. 200.321, Contractor acknowledges that if it subcontracts any work pertaining to this Agreement, it will take all necessary affirmative steps to assure that minority businesses, women's business enterprises, and labor surplus area firms are used when possible. Affirmative Steps include: (1) Placing qualified small and minority businesses and women's business enterprises on solicitation lists; (2) Assuring that small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises are solicited whenever they are potential sources; (3) Dividing total requirements, when economically feasible, into smaller tasks or quantities to permit maximum participation by small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises; (4) Establishing delivery schedules, where the requirement permits, which encourage participation by small and minority businesses, and women's business enterprises; (5) Using the services and assistance, as appropriate, of such organizations as the Small Business Administration and the Minority Business Development Agency of the Department of Commerce.

Davis-Bacon Act: For all construction contracts and other projects, if applicable, the Contractor agrees to comply with all provisions of the Davis Bacon Act as amended (40 U.S.C. §§ 3141-3144 and 3136-3148), and to require all of its subcontractors performing work under this Agreement to adhere to same. The Contractor and its subcontractors are required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, the Contractor and its subcontractors are required to pay wages not less than once a week. If the federally funded award contains Davis Bacon provisions, the Contractor shall place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in the solicitation documents. The decision to award a contract shall be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The Contractor shall report all suspected or reported violations of the Davis-Bacon Act to the County.

Copeland Anti Kick Back Act: Contractor and its subcontractors shall comply with all the requirements of the Copeland Anti-Kickback Act (18 U.S.C. § 874 and 40 U.S.C. § 3145, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 CFR Part 3), which are incorporated by reference to this Agreement. Contractor and its subcontractors are prohibited from inducing by any means

any person employed in the construction, completion or repair of public work to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The contractor or subcontractors shall insert in any subcontracts the clause above and such other clauses as FEMA may by appropriate instructions require, and also a clause requiring subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier contracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all of these contract clauses. A breach of the contract clauses above may be grounds for termination of the contract, and for debarment as a contractor and subcontractor as provided in 29 C.F.R. s. 5.12.

Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 3701–3708 and 29 C.F.R. §§ 5.5 (b)(1)-(4).

Contracts awarded in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics and laborers must be in compliance with 40 U.S.C. ss.3702 and 3704, as supplemented by the Department of Labor Regulations in 29 C.F.R. Part 5.

(1) Overtime requirements. (3) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. The County shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (b)(2) of this section. (4) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraph (b)(1) through (4) of this section and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs (b)(1) through (4) of this section."

Byrd Anti-Lobbying (31 U.S.C s. 1352, as amended).

Contractors who apply or bid for an award of more than \$100,000 shall file the required Anti-Lobbying certification at the time of bid. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used federally appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with obtaining any federal contract, grant, or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. s. 1352. Each tier shall also disclose any lobbying with non-federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the recipient who in turn will forward the certification(s) to the Federal awarding agency.

DHS Seal, Logo and Flags.

The Contractor shall not use the DHS seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of the flags or likenesses of DHS agency officials without specific FEMA pre-approval. The contractor shall include this provision in any subcontracts.

Access to Records.

The Contractor agrees to provide Charlotte County, the FDEM, the FEMA Administrator, the Comptroller General of the United States, any other Federal grantor, or any of their authorized representatives, access to any books, documents, papers, and records of the Contractor which are directly pertinent to this contract for the purposes of making audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcriptions. The Contractor agrees to permit any of the foregoing parties to reproduce by any means whatsoever or to copy excerpts and transcriptions as reasonably needed. The Contractor agrees to provide the FEMA Administrator or the administrator of any other Federal grantor, or their authorized representatives, access to construction or other work sites pertaining to the work being completed under the agreement. In compliance with section 1225 of the Disaster Recovery Reform Act of 2018, Charlotte County and the Contractor acknowledge and agree that no language in this agreement is intended to prohibit audits or internal review by the FEMA Administrator, any other Federal grantor, or the Comptroller General of the United States.

Compliance with Federal Law, Regulations, and Executive Orders and Acknowledgement of Federal Funding.

This is an acknowledgement that FEMA financial assistance will be used to fund all or a portion of the agreement. The Contractor will comply with all applicable

federal law, regulations, executive orders, FEMA policies, procedures and directives.

No Obligation by Federal Government.

The federal government is not a party to this agreement and is not subject to any obligations or liabilities to the non-federal entity, contractor, or any other party pertaining to any matter resulting from the agreement.

Program Fraud and False or Fraudulent Statements or Related Acts.

The Contractor acknowledges that 31 U.S.C. Chapter 38 (Administrative Remedies for False Claims and Statements) applies to the Contractor's actions pertaining to this agreement.

Copyright and Data Rights.

The Contractor grants to Charlotte County a paid-up royalty-free, nonexclusive, irrevocable, worldwide license in data first produced in the performance if this agreement to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, including prepare derivative works, distribute copies to the public, and perform publicly and display publicly such data. For data required by the agreement but not first produced in the performance of this agreement, the Contractor will identify such data and grant to Charlotte County or acquire on its behalf a license of the same scope as for data first produced in the performance if this agreement.

Remedies.

Unless otherwise provided by the agreement, all claims, counterclaims, disputes and other matters in question between the County and the Contractor arising out of or relating to the agreement, or the breach of it, that cannot be resolved by and between the parties after conferring in good faith, will be decided by a court of competent jurisdiction pursuant to Florida law. If such dispute is in state court, venue shall be in the Twentieth Judicial Circuit Court in and for Charlotte County, Florida. If in federal court, venue shall be in the U.S. District Court for the Middle District of Florida, Ft. Myers Division.

Termination for Cause or Convenience.

The County may terminate the agreement at any time, for cause or convenience, by providing written notice to the Contractor, of determined by the County to be in the County's best interest. If the agreement is terminated, the Contractor shall be paid for all work actually performed, and all costs actually incurred prior to contract termination.
