American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Update

ARPA Overview

- American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) signed into law on March 11, 2021
- Charlotte County allocated \$36,693,553
- Eligible expenses encumbered between March 3, 2021 through December 31, 2021.
- Interim Final Rule released by U.S. Department of Treasury on May 10, 2021



Eligible Expenses under ARPA

ARPA Eligible Expenses (Per Sec. 602(c)(1) and 603(c)(1) of interim final guidance):

- To respond to the public health emergency or its negative economic impacts;
- 2. To respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency by providing premium pay to eligible workers;
- 3. For the provision of government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue to the COVID-19 public health emergency relative to revenues collected in the most recent full fiscal year prior to the emergency; and,
- 4. To make necessary investments in water, sewer, or broadband infrastructure.



Public Health Emergency

- Services and programs to contain and mitigate the spread of COVID-19
- Capital investments in public facilities to meet pandemic operational needs
- Services to address behavioral healthcare needs exacerbated by the pandemic
- Payroll and covered benefit expenses for staff primarily dedicated to pandemic response



Negative Economic Impacts

- Individual, small business and nonprofit assistance
- Recovery of tourism, travel and hospitality sectors
- Serving hardest-hit communities & families in qualified census tracts or disproportionately impacted



Provision of Government Services

- Replacing lost public sector revenue
- Providing premium pay for essential workers (can include private sector)
- Reemployment of public sector employees



Water, Sewer and Broadband Infrastructure

- Investment in water infrastructure
- Investment in wastewater infrastructure
- Investment in stormwater treatment
- Facilitating water reuse
- Investment in broadband for unserved or underserved



Charlotte County ARPA Spending Plan

- Workshop October 16, 2021
- Recommend annual review and spending plan for each of the 4 years
- Incorporates expenses already incurred
- Incorporates commitments already made
